- Usage of language lab and ICT enabled classrooms, listening of audios, watching of documentaries, videos, and films, as well as interaction with native Chinese speakers are used as teaching tools other than lectures to impart language skills and understanding of Chinese society, culture etc.
- Practical on-field learning in addition to interactive classroom teaching/learning
- > Use of technology; Preparation of handouts pre and post session and Student's seminar
- The usage of multi-media laboratory and to integrate innovative content on culture, current affairs and society of the German-speaking countries into teaching at BA and MA Level.
- Emphasis on experiential learning from fieldwork which constitutes 40% of the syllabus. Apart from these, each course has different assignments and projects which enhance the learning of students while interacting with various development organisations. Various workshops have been organised for students.
- Continuous bilateral communication between students and teachers as well as between teachers, as a part of reflexive exercise in teaching and learning, constitute a significant component of the academic endeavour. Students are exposed to recurring research

themes and methodologies of the social science disciplines and learning is shown as a multifaceted process. Students are given exposure to the latest trends in academic worldacross knowledge systems. Cultivation of critical thinking and the spirit of inquiry is an integral component to the learning and research activities.

#### 6.3.6 Human Resource Management

The UGC prescribed Teacher-student ratio for UG/PG and research is strictly adhered to by the University. No research students are allotted to Adjunct Faculty, Visiting Faculty as well as Contract Faculty Teachers are facilitated in attending training programs, workshops, and seminars for development of competencies and networking.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

As on 20.10.2016, the teaching staff was 59 [Professor - 08, Associate Professor - 05 (04 promoted as Professor) and Assistant Professor - 46] (one Assistant Professor appointed against the post of Associate Professor).

The University had conducted interviews for the various teaching posts from the  $21^{st}$  October, 2016. After recommendations of the various Selection Committee(s) and the approval of the Executive Council in its meeting held on 05.01.2017, the University had offered 29 candidates for appointment of Professor – 01, Associate Professor – 06 and Assistant Professor – 22 against the Employment Notification No.18/2016 dated 26.02.2016.

To Consider and approve the recommendations of Selection Committees for appointment of teachers through Direct Recruitment and promotion under CAS in various Schools and Centres of the University <u>Resolution – 22:</u> The Registrar apprised the House about the Notification issued for recruitment of Teaching Posts and the meetings of Selection Committee convened for conducting the interviews for recommending candidates for appointment through interviews. The House was informed that the eligibility criteria and procedure followed for Selection are in compliance with the UGC Regulations notified in Gazette and in compliance with provisions of Ordinance 19 of CUG relating to recruitment for teaching posts. Thereafter, the Registrar opened the sealed covers containing the recommendations of Selection Committee in various Schools and Centres one by one and placed before the Executive Council for its approval.	Appointment Letters to the 29 candidates recommended under Direct Recruitment were issued and so far, all except Prof. Sarita Agrawal, have reported for duties in the University. Office Orders of promotion under CAS have been issued to the concerned faculty as approved by the Executive Council and these faculty have submitted their joining report.
	The Executive Council having found these recommendations in order and in compliance with relevant UGC Regulations and CUG Ordinance, unanimously approved recommendations of the Selection Committee as well as issue of orders of appointment to these candidates as per the standard and prescribed terms and conditions. The House placed on record its appreciation for the Hon'ble Vice Chancellor and the supporting staff for having done a commendable job in completing the	

## recruitment process in 9 Schools and Centres in a very short span of time.

#### Approval of Recommendations of Selection Committees for Promotion under Career Advancement Scheme

The Registrar apprised the House about the implementation of Career Advancement Scheme in Central University of Gujarat and applications invited from the eligible teachers of CUG for promotion under CAS. He informed that the interviews for promotion from Associate Professor to Professor were already completed and orders were issued in the month of March, 2016 except in two cases out of which in case of candidate. clarification regarding past one experience/service and fixation of pay by the Commissioner of Higher Education, Govt. of Gujarat had to be obtained and in the other, an Enguiry by a EC Committee to look into the serious allegations of discrimination and bias based on caste by a SC student was pending against the candidate on serious.

Having clarified the status of promotion under CAS, Registrar presented before the House the recommendations of the Selection Committees for promotion of teachers under CAS.

Hon'ble Vice Chancellor explained to the House that in case of Dr. Indira Dutta who was earlier an employee of L. D. Arts College Ahmedabad, a Grant-in-aid college of Government of Gujarat was also in service of Central University of Gujarat on deputation. The Selection Committee which met earlier on 21.03.2016 had decided to keep her promotion in abeyance till additional requisite information is obtained from the previous employer and the Commissioner of Collegiate Education, Govt. of Gujarat to decide the date of eligibility. Further, subsequently relevant documents regarding her promotion as Associate Professor at L.D. Arts College, Ahmedabad and fixation of pay as Associate Professor with AGP of Rs. 9000 with effect from 11.11.2009 vide order No Fixation/ROP/06/1343 of Dr. Indira Dutta issued by Commissioner of Collegiate Education have been produced based on which the date of eligibility of her promotion falls before the date of her joining the Central University of Gujrat as Associate Professor on 23/07/2013. In view of the above, it is decided to fix her date of eligibility taking into consideration her date of completion of probation period i.e. 23/07/2014.
