Rooting with its strong emphasis on simultaneous field work, block-placements, internships integrated over semesters not only offers a dynamic academic space, but also bridges a growing network of partnerships in the social sector widely.

Practicum

Practice learning in social work training plays a pivotal role in developing professional skills necessary for working with people. It has several components that provide the students with opportunities to learn, explore and develop skills. It enables students to gain experience by putting theoretical learning to practical situations. Most importantly, it creates a holistic understanding of social problems and their causative factors while providing the opportunity to envision and rethink strategies for intervention.

Components

1. Orientation Programme

The Orientation Program is the first part of learning process that intends students to set them up for the practical learning experience. It provides a solid foundation by making the students realize the practical background of their theoretical study and empowering them with simple tools necessary for fieldwork. This segment familiarizes students including the ethics, values and principles of social work that guides professional practice, encompassing-

- Introduction to curriculum and fieldwork expectations.
- Overview of the agency settings and fields of social work practice.
- Observations of functioning and services in different organizations and institutions.

2. Concurrent Practice Learning

The concurrent model is a core component of social work training that enables student to continuously reflect on their field experiences, evolving both personally and professionally. Simultaneous practice learning is an ongoing and integral component of the academic calendar. Typically, students are placed in different social agencies for three days per week, in addition to their classroom instructions. This dual structure ensures:

- Skill development in areas of case work, group work, community organization and documentation.
- Application of theoretical concepts to the real-world settings.
- To build accountability, confidentiality, respect for diversity and commitment to social justice.

3. Winter Placement

Winter placement is an invaluable short-term part of social work practice learning, generally taken during mid-academic break, often in December. In contrast to concurrent fieldwork spread over a longer period with weekly involvement, winter placements are full-time and immersive, being continued for 3-4 weeks. This intense format enables students to immerse themselves in organizational design and community-level interventions with a condensed timeframe.

Key features and opportunities:

- Winter placement emphasizes students to engage in needs assessments, community mapping, surveys and reporting, awareness campaigns, mobilization by using social work tools and methods intensively.
- To understand the region-specific social complexities and cultural context, students are voluntarily required to select their placement locations based on their area of interest, (for example, working with human-rights based organizations, public health sector, disaster-prone regions and other multi-faceted social environments) with preferred regions and professional learning goals.
- For broadening vision, students obtain first-hand knowledge about macro-level factors, including policy gaps, role of international agencies in development and humanitarian aid.

4. Block Placement

Block placement is the final and most intensive fieldwork component of the social work curriculum. It usually takes place after the completion of regular fieldwork components, often during the final semester. While in contrast to concurrent fieldwork, which is conducted concurrently with the academic session, block placement is an intensive and prolonged usually for 4-5 weeks or more than that, depending on the institutional policies.

Structure and engagement

- Full-time integration: Work full-time with the organization, adhering to regular office hours.
- Responsibility handling: Handle responsibilities under professional supervision.
- Exposure Visits: Placements include field exposure in relation to projects and organization, to create a base on inter-organizational collaboration.
- Client interaction: Direct engagements with the target groups involving counselling, interviewing, group work and home-visits to grasp the social dynamics.
- Independent initiatives: Students are encouraged to take initiatives in micro-projects or conduct small-scale surveys or develop IEC(Information, Education & Communication) materials related to the agency's thematic focus.
